US Authorities Charge Pakistani National With Plotting New York Attack

WASHINGTON: Authorities in the United States have charged a Pakistani man for allegedly plotting to carry out an attack in New York City in support of the Daesh, media reported quoting the US Department of Justice.

Identified as Muhammad Shahzeb Khan, also known as Shahzeb Jaoun, was arrested on Wednesday and is accused of plotting a mass shooting at a Jewish centre in Brooklyn.

US Attorney General Merrick Garland has said that Khan aimed to kill "as many Jewish people as possible."

The suspect, who may face up to 20 years in prison, allegedly attempted to travel from Canada to the US where he intended to use automatic and semi-automatic weapons to carry out the attack, according to the indictment.

The Royal Canadian Mounted Police said in a statement Friday they arrested Khan on Wednesday in Ormstown, Quebec, south of Montreal.

The Pakistani man had allegedly told two under-

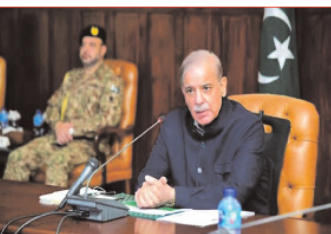


cover law enforcement officers of his plans to create "a real offline cell" of Daesh supporters to carry out an attack, the indictment alleged.

Khan — set to appear before a court in Montreal on September 13 — allegedly instructed them to obtain AR-style assault rifles, ammunition and other materials to carry out the attacks and identified specific locations where the attacks would take place.

Prosecutors have said that the suspect New York City because it has "the largest Jewish population in America."

Police Crack Down On PTI Supporters As Deadline Passes For Islamabad Rally

ISLAMABAD: Following the directives issued by the district administration, the police have launched a crackdown after the deadline of Pakistan Tehreek-e-Insaf's (PTI) much-hyped rally at outskirts of the federal capital ended on Sunday.

The rally kicked off with tight security in the federal capital as the participants of the rally gathered at the venue — Sangyani locality, while multiple caravans moved towards the city under the leadership of Khyber Pakhtunkhwa (KP) Chief Minister Ali Amin Gandapur, despite roadblocks at various points.

The former ruling party had been finally allowed to hold the gathering today (September 8) under a no-objection certificate (NOC) issued earlier in the week, after postponing it twice — once in July and then in August — after authorities revoked the permission. The multiple deferrals drew scathing criticism from party leaders and workers for not being able to hold the public



gathering. However, the Islamabad district administration put the security on high alert this morning and blocked off multiple arteries leading to the capital city, in the light of the "Peaceful Assembly and Public Order Bill, 2024" aimed at regulating public gatherings, which was signed into a law by President Asif Ali Zardari just a day ahead of the rally.

The public rally began with PTI leader Hamid Azhar addressing the crowd, stating that the hindrance created by the incumbent rulers evinced that they were afraid of incarcerated Imran

and the Constitution. "We will enter Punjab with 50,000 people from the Khyber Pakhtunkhwa within a week," he said, adding that they will even set off on foot and face the tear gas.

Meanwhile, party leader Muhammad Ali Khan said they had never thought that Imran Khan would be jailed, lamenting that many other PTI leaders, including Qasim Suri, Shehryar Afridi, and Murad Saeed, had been forced to leave the country.

Listing the former ruling party's demands, Ali Khan demanded that those who came to power on the back of Form 47 release the PTI founder, warning that otherwise, "you will be swept away by the sea of people."

He also called for the restoration of the supremacy of the Constitution and the rule of law.

"When an attempt was made to subvert the Supreme Court and judiciary under the guise of legislation, Imran Khan urged people to take to the streets," Ali Khan said, adding that, as all institutions

have been destroyed, hopes are now pinned on the apex court.

As the PTI leaders addressed the gathering, Islamabad district administration issued a notification of the deadline for rally conclusion, according to which, the party is supposed to wrap up the event by 7pm.

Islamabad Deputy Commissioner Irfan Nawaz Memon said that PTI has been officially notified about the time limit and an action will be taken on the violation of the NOC.

"Not concluding the gathering within the deadline will be considered a violation of NOC," he added.

The official further stated that the loudspeakers and microphones will be turned off and entry points into the city will be closed after the deadline's end to prevent any further incoming participants.

As soon as the deadline ended, the district administration directed the police to take action against the rally-goers for not complying to the NOC.—RT/Agency

On Literacy Day, PM Calls For Nationwide Support To Ensure Education For All

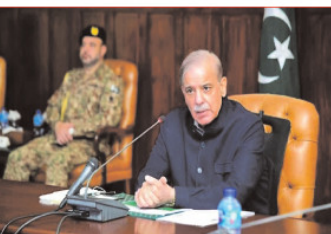

Rana Sanaullah Denounces Imran And PTI As 'Israeli Political Brand'



ISLAMABAD: Advisor to the Prime Minister and President of the Pakistan Muslim League (N) Punjab Rana Sanaullah has called Imran Khan and the Pakistan Tehreek-e-Insaf (PTI) an "Israeli political brand."

In a statement on Sunday, Sanaullah highlighted that the Times of Israel has revealed the truth behind the so-called 'revolution' and 'change' in Pakistan, providing clarity on the planning and motives behind the May 9 attacks.

The PML-N leader criticised the 'foreign funding' and 'social service' initiatives, suggesting they were part of a broader scheme aimed at altering Pakistan's Islamic ideology and foreign policy.

He stated that reading the Israeli newspaper's article makes it evident why efforts were made to oust Nawaz

Sharif, who is credited with advancing Pakistan's nuclear capabilities, introducing the China-Pakistan Economic Corridor (CPEC), and elevating the country's economic development to unprecedented levels.

Sanaullah also questioned why Israel had supported Imran Khan and why the US Congress had passed a resolution in favour of his policies, suggesting that the connections between these events are now clearly exposed. He argued that Imran Khan and PTI represent an Israeli brand that was strategically given an 'Islamic touch' to gain popularity among Muslims.

He called for a boycott of this "political brand" by all Muslims, including those in Pakistan, asserting that PTI now faces not just criticism but a need for a reckoning.—RT/Agency

Eight Hospitalized In Khairpur After Consuming Poisonous Food



KHAIRPUR: Eight people, including women and children, were hospitalized in Khairpur after consuming poisonous food in the village of Babarlu. The incident, which occurred after the family's evening meal, has raised significant concern among local residents. The affected individuals were rushed to Civil Hospital Khairpur in an unconscious state following their meal of chickpeas and bread. The symptoms displayed included severe vomiting and loss of consciousness, indicating acute food poisoning. According to the family's relatives, the food was prepared at home, and no prior issues had been reported. Upon arrival at the hospital, doctors immediately began treatment, focusing on removing the toxic substances from the patients' stomachs. The hospital's medical team is working diligently to stabilize the patients. Initial reports suggest that the patients are expected to regain consciousness soon as treatment progresses. Authorities are investigating the source of the contamination to prevent future incidents and ensure the safety of the local food supply. This unfortunate event underscores the need for heightened food safety practices and vigilance to avoid similar occurrences in the future. The community is anxiously awaiting further updates on the condition of the affected individuals.—RT

Hyderabad Anti-Terrorism Court Delivers Verdict In High-Profile Terrorism Case

HYDERABAD: In a significant development, the Honorable Anti-Terrorism Court has handed down a stringent sentence to a notorious terrorist, marking a crucial victory for law enforcement in the fight against extremism. The convicted terrorist, identified as Arbab Bhil, Vice President of the banned Jeay Sindh Quami Mahaz (JSQM) Areser faction and a key facilitator for the banned Sindh Revolutionary Army (SRA), has been sentenced to five years in prison and fined Rs. 100,000. Additionally, he has been given ten years' imprisonment for his involvement in two separate cases under the Sindh Arms Act.



Arbab Bhil, a prominent figure in the terrorist networks operating within the Hyderabad and Mirpurkhas regions, was apprehended on January 15, 2024. His arrest was the result of a meticulously executed intelligence-based operation led by the Counter-Terrorism Department (CTD) Hyderabad. The operation uncovered significant evidence linking Bhil to terrorist financing and arms smuggling. During the raid, law enforcement officials recovered a substantial sum of Rs. 50,000, which was believed to be intended for terrorist activities. In addition to the cash, Bhil was found in possession of a receipt book related to SRA funding and several unlicensed firearms. These discoveries led to the registration of FIR Cr/No 02/2024 for terrorist financing and FIR Cr/No. 03/2024 for violations under the Sindh Arms Act at the CTD Hyderabad police station. The case against Bhil was heard at the Anti-Terrorism Court Hyderabad No. 2, with proceedings conducted within the confines of Central Jail Hyderabad due to the high-security nature of the case. The court's ruling reflects a decisive stance against terrorism and is expected to serve as a deterrent to others involved in similar criminal activities. The successful prosecution and sentencing of Arbab Bhil underscore the ongoing efforts of the CTD Hyderabad in combating terrorism and ensuring justice for the people of the region. The verdict also highlights the effectiveness of intelligence-driven operations in dismantling extremist networks and securing public safety.

Urgent Appeal For Drainage As Villages Near Badin Face Major Crop Losses

BADIN: The Union Council of Abdullah Shah, near Badin, is on the brink of a major agricultural crisis as hundreds of acres of standing crops in the villages of Somar Jamali and Karim Baksh Jamali are submerged under floodwaters. Chief Minister Sindh, Adil Faryal Talpur, has issued an urgent appeal for the immediate drainage of the water to mitigate the damage. Reports indicate that the extensive flooding has inundated both crops and residential areas in these villages, with many households experiencing waterlogging that has made daily activities, such as commuting to schools, increasingly difficult. Despite the dire situation, influential local figures, including Master Ashraf Jamali, have reportedly obstructed drainage efforts, citing various concerns and threats. Villagers, including Luqman Jamali and Muntaj Jamali, have voiced their frustration, emphasizing their long-standing support for the Pakistan Peoples Party (PPP) since the era of Zulfikar Ali Bhutto. They have expressed their disappointment with the party's failure to address their current plight effectively. Police Clash With Accused's Relatives In Badin: SSP Vows To Maintain Law And Order

BADIN: In a significant escalation of a criminal case, the Badin police faced violent resistance from the relatives of an accused motorcycle thief on the Hyderabad-Badin main road. SSP Badin, Shiraz Nazir, addressed the situation, asserting that no one would be permitted to take the law into their own hands. This assertion follows a recent incident involving the arrest of John Muhammad, alias Janu Magasi, who was apprehended by the Matli police on charges of motorcycle theft. The theft case was registered at Matli police station based on the complaint filed by Sardar Kashmiri, a local resident of Matli. The accused, John Muhammad, had allegedly stolen a motorcycle from Sriwal Colony, an act witnessed firsthand by the plaintiff. As the Matli police were transporting the accused to the station, they were intercepted by the accused's relatives who forcibly rescued him from police custody. This act of defiance led to severe disruptions on the Hyderabad-Badin main road, causing considerable inconvenience to passengers and other road users. The situation escalated further when the Magasi community members reportedly fired at the police and threw stones, resulting in injuries to several officers. In response, the Matli police have registered cases against hundreds of individuals involved in obstructing justice and blocking the main highway.

So far, three suspects—Asif Magasi, Sohail Magasi, and Abdul Majeed Magasi—have been arrested in connection with the violent confrontation. SSP Shiraz Nazir emphasized that Badin is a district committed to maintaining peace, and the law enforcement agencies will not tolerate any form of lawlessness. The SSP assured that the Badin police are resolute in their commitment to uphold the rule of law and maintain public order. The department's morale remains high, and efforts to address criminal activities and ensure the safety of the community will continue unabated. The authorities are determined to restore order and hold those responsible for the violence accountable. Labourer Killed In Road Accident On National Highway Near Shikarpur

SHIKARPUR: A tragic road accident on the National Highway near Hamayoon, within the jurisdiction of Sultankot police station, resulted in the death of a labourer on Sunday. According to initial reports, the victim, identified as Zulfikar Ali Dayo, a resident of Sultankot, was struck by a speeding car while working near the highway. The collision was severe, and the body was handed over to the Zulfikar Ali Dayo died on the spot. The driver of the vehicle involved in the accident fled the scene immediately after the incident, leaving the area quickly. Despite efforts to locate the driver, no arrests have been made, and no FIR had been registered by late evening. The body of Zulfikar Ali Dayo was transported to a local hospital for medico-legal formalities. Following the completion of these procedures, the body was handed over to his family for burial. The incident has sparked outrage within the community, raising concerns about road safety and the need for stricter enforcement of traffic laws. Local residents are calling for immediate action to apprehend the driver responsible and to prevent similar tragedies in the future. The Sultankot police are continuing their investigation and are urging anyone with information about the accident or the whereabouts of the fleeing driver to come forward and assist with the inquiry.—RT

Punjab Information Minister: Imran Khan Won't Secure Release Through Power Displays

LAHORE: As the Pakistan Tehreek-e-Insaf (PTI) prepares to flex its political muscle in Islamabad today, Punjab Information Minister Azma Bokhari claimed on Sunday that such power shows would bring the party's founder, Imran Khan, out of jail.



The major opposition party is set to hold a public rally in Sangiani, a locality of the federal capital, today, with convoys of loyalists led by senior PTI leaders arriving from various cities across the country.

"Today, they [PTI] are going to stage a drama in Islamabad," said Bokhari in a press conference, slamming the Imran-founded party's power show in the federal capital.

She added that such public gatherings and rallies would do nothing to release the incarcerated premier.

She said that the PTI

founder could only be released from jail via courts after facing cases against him. "There is neither an NRO for him nor will these power shows change anything," she added.

The provincial minister said that the government was not afraid of political events, however, "we are concerned about their [PTI] past activities."

She was referring to the violent protests that erupted after the ex-premier's arrest on May 9 last year in which government

countries, aiding those seeking the political asylum.

The group also included individuals from India and Afghanistan, meanwhile, the investigations revealed that the gang has connections to international criminal gangs and exposed an Indian plot to tarnish Pakistan's reputation.

Federal Interior Minister Mohsin Naqvi lauded the efforts of Pakistan's intelligence agencies and FIA Lahore on the successful operation, calling it a significant milestone to combat human trafficking.

He vowed to continue similar operations and pledged to tackle the human trafficking mafia with "iron hands"—RT/Agency

Nationwide Anti-Polio Vaccination Campaign Launches Today

ISLAMABAD: Pakistan is set to launch a nationwide anti-polio campaign on September 9 (tomorrow), targeting children under five years of age.



The initiative aims to administer polio drops to millions of children to curb the spread of the disease.

In preparation for the major immunisation drive, several district administrations have already begun local polio vaccination efforts.

These drives set the stage for a larger campaign organised by the health department, scheduled for Monday.

In Punjab, the week-long campaign will focus on vaccinating 13.9 million children in key districts such as Lahore, Rawalpindi, and Faisalabad.

Other districts, including Attock, Chakwal, Multan, Bahawalpur, Bahawalnagar, and others, will hold a five-day campaign to vaccinate children.

Khyber Pakhtunkhwa has constituted over 35,000 polio teams to carry out door-to-door vaccinations, ensuring every child under five receives the polio drops.

In Sindh, the drive will span a week and aim to reach 9.4 million children across 30 districts, including Hyderabad. Meanwhile, in Balochistan, more than 11,000 teams have been formed for the week-long vaccination effort.

The Provincial Coordinator of the Emergency Operation Center has called on parents, media, and citizens to actively support the cam-

paign to make it a success and protect the future generation from polio.

Islamabad has reported its first case of poliovirus in 16 years, bringing the total number of cases in Pakistan this year to 17, officials confirmed.

The newly reported case comes from Islamabad's Union Council Rural 4, near Sangiani Toll Plaza, according to the Regional Reference Laboratory for Polio at the National Institute of Health. The victim is an eight-year-old boy, marking the city's first polio case since 2008.—RT/Agency

Russian Military Drone Crashes On NATO Territory, Says Latvia

Riga: Latvia's president on Sunday said a Russian military drone had crashed on its territory, adding that airspace breaches had increased along NATO's eastern borders.



The Baltic state, which was once ruled by the Soviet Union but is now an EU and NATO member, has had tense relations with Moscow following independence, and ties have further deteriorated since Russia invaded Ukraine in February 2022.

A "Russian military drone... crashed in the eastern part of Latvia yesterday. There is an ongoing investigation," said Latvian President Edgars Rinkevics said on X.

"We are in close contact with our allies. The number of such incidents is increasing along the eastern flank of NATO and we must address them collectively," he added.

Latvia's defence ministry said in a statement that the drone had flown into the country's airspace from Belarus and crashed in the municipality of Rezekne.

"This situation is a confirmation that we

need to continue the work we have started to strengthen Latvia's eastern border, including the development of air defence capabilities and electronic warfare capabilities to limit the activities of UAVs of different applications," said Defence Minister Andris Spruds.

Fellow NATO member Romania also on Sunday said a Russian attack drone targeting civilian infrastructure in neighbouring Ukraine overnight had entered its airspace.

Bucharest strongly condemned the "renewed violation" brought on by Moscow's "illegal attacks".

Since launching its invasion, Russia has repeatedly carried out night attacks on cities across

Ukraine, frequently targeting ports in the southern Odessa region after exiting a grain export deal.

Poland has also recorded at least two cases of its airspace being violated by Russian missiles or drones attacking Ukraine, most recently in December.

Warsaw late last month declared that a flying object had intruded into its airspace but later backtracked on the claim. In an interview with the Financial Times published last week, Polish Foreign Minister Radoslaw Sikorski said Warsaw should have the right to shoot down Russian missiles targeting Ukraine before they enter Polish airspace, despite NATO opposition.—Agency

Elon Musk now controls 62% of Earth's active satellites after latest Starlink launch



Elon Musk has solidified his dominance in space, with nearly two-thirds of all active satellites now under his control.

This development follows the launch of SpaceX's 7,000th Starlink satellite, bringing the total number of active satellites to 6,370.

SpaceX's internet satellite constellation, Starlink, has been expanding at an impressive rate, with an average of three satellites launched per day since its inception in 2019.

According to data from non-profit satellite tracker Celestrak, SpaceX now controls over 62 percent of the world's operational satellites.

This number is nearly ten times the amount operated by its closest competitor, OneWeb, a UK-based company that became reliant on SpaceX after the Russian in-

vasion of Ukraine forced it to abandon launches with Russia's Soyuz.

The Starlink constellation, designed to provide high-speed internet and phone connectivity worldwide, currently operates in 102 countries and serves over three million customers.

SpaceX plans to launch up to 42,000 satellites in total, extending coverage to more countries. Afghanistan, China, Iran, North Korea, Russia, and Syria are excluded from the list due to trade embargoes and internet restrictions, but reports have surfaced of illegal Starlink equipment entering restricted regions like Iran.

Musk recently highlighted his control of the satellite network, tweeting "Starlink now constitutes roughly 2/3 of all active Earth satellites."—Agency

CIA, MI6 chiefs warn world order facing greatest threat since Cold War

LONDON: CIA Director Bill Burns and UK MI6 chief Richard Moore warned on Saturday that the world order "was under threat in a way we haven't seen since the Cold War".



Writing in a Financial Times op-ed, the two spy chiefs said "we have no more trusted or esteemed allies" than each other, adding that the partnership would be vital as they "face an unprecedented array of threats", chiefly from Russia, China and in the Middle East.

The ongoing conflict in Gaza is of particular concern, and Burns later told an FT conference in London that he was "working hard" with Egyptian and Qatari mediators to refine a framework for a ceasefire.

"We will make this more detailed proposal, I hope, in the next several days," he added.

The United States and UK are among the leading financial and military supporters of Ukraine in its resistance to the Russian invasion

launched in February 2022.

"Staying the course is more vital than ever," they wrote in the op-ed. "We continue to work together to disrupt the reckless campaign of sabotage across Europe being waged by Russian intelligence."

The pair also explained how they were now using advanced AI and cloud technologies to harness the vast troves of data they collect.

The joint article comes days before UK Prime Minister Keir Starmer's visit to Washington on September 13,

where he will be received by US President Joe Biden.

They will discuss, among other things, "continuing robust support to Ukraine" and the desire to achieve a truce in Gaza, the White House said on Friday.

This meeting takes place at a time when the two nations' stance on Israel is diverging. Biden has announced the suspension of 30 arms export licences to Israel, citing a risk that they could be used in violation of international law in war-destroyed Gaza.—Agency

NEW DELHI: Indian rescuers pulled out eight bodies Sunday from the wreckage of a three-storey building in the city of Lucknow, reports said, with the state minister calling the deaths "heart breaking".

The Press Trust of India (PTI) news agency broadcast images of piles of concrete, and state rescue teams with heavy digging machines searching for bodies.

PTI quoted officials as saying eight bodies had been pulled out, and 28 people were injured.

It was not clear if there were others still trapped. The cause of the collapse is not known, but building and construction accidents are common during India's June-September monsoon season, with old and rickety structures buckling under days of non-stop rain.—Agency

The Iranian para-athlete celebrated his victory by showing a religious flag, which led to his disqualification from the games.

This turn of events altered the medal standings, upgrading the silver medal of India's Navdeep Singh to gold.

Beit Sayah told reporters that he had displayed a religious flag during his victory celebration at the Tokyo 2020 Paralympic Games without any issues.

Indian para-athlete Navdeep Singh's silver medal in the men's javelin throw F11 was then upgraded to gold.

This victory marks India's first-ever gold medal in the F11 men's javelin category.

Navdeep Singh, a 23-year-old athlete from Haryana, achieved a personal best of 47.32m, securing the top spot in the competition.

Navdeep, who competes in the classification meant for athletes of short stature, originally ended with a silver after he upstaged world record holder Sun Pengxiang of China with a 47.32m throw.

However, that was upgraded to an unprecedented gold after Sadeq's disqualification. Pengxiang (44.72m) finished with a silver.

Sayah had managed to nose ahead of the field with a new Paralympic record of 47.64m in his penultimate throw but lost the medal owing to his antics.

Social media users and prominent political and cultural figures in Iran criticized the decision to disqualify Beit Sayah, saying the athlete was right to express his religious enthusiasm after winning the gold medal.—Agency

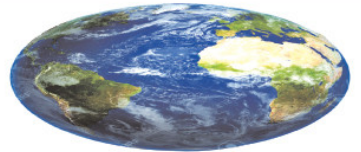
The Atlas actress then explained that the reason behind struggling was "the character traits and development," which "hit too close to home."

Typhoon Yagi weakens after killing 14 in Vietnam

Asia's most powerful typhoon this year, Yagi, has killed 14 people in Vietnam and injured 176 others after making landfall in the country, as per Vietnamese state media.



The Super Typhoon has now downgraded to a tropical depression, still, the authorities have alerted about risks of flooding and landslides as the storm moves towards the west.

The Indo-Pacific Tropical Cyclone Warning Center stated that the storm hit Hai Phong and Quang Ninh provinces in Vietnam with high winds of up to 203km/h (126mph).

Yagi lifted roofs and uprooted trees in the country's capital, Hanoi, leading to power outages in the region, according to BBC. Vietnamese official media reported that three people were killed due to the storm in northern Quang Ninh province on Saturday and another person died in Hai Duong. BBC also reports that four family members died in a landslide incident amid Yagi's landfall in the Hoa Binh province, a mountainous region, around midnight.

48 Killed After Fuel Truck Explodes In Nigeria After Collision With Vehicle



Nigeria: At least 48 people were killed on Sunday in a fuel tanker truck explosion following a collision with another vehicle in north-central Nigeria, the state's disaster management agency said. The State Emergency Management Agency in north-central Niger state said the fuel truck collided with a truck carrying travellers and cattle. Several other vehicles were also caught up in the accident, it was said.

Lahore Police Identify Suspect In Javed Butt Murder Case

LAHORE: A huge development has emerged in Javed Butt murder case, as the police identified the shooter allegedly involved in the Javed Butt, the brother-in-law of Taifi Butt, murder case in Lahore, media reported on Sunday. The police made CCTV footage public in which the alleged shooter can be seen riding a motorbike after the incident. The police officials disclosed that the shooter, wearing a helmet, parked his motorcycle, boarded a rickshaw to approach Javed Butt's car, and opened multiple fires which resulted in the death of the victim.

The investigation team claimed that the shooter was aged between 60-65 years old and had a white beard, meanwhile, the police stated that the investigation team is currently obtaining all the relevant information about the shooter before taking action. It is worth mentioning here that Javed Butt, the brother-in-law of Taifi Butt, the main suspect in the murder of Ameer Balaj, was shot dead in Lahore. As per the details, the incident occurred near the underpass on Kunal Road in the Ichhra area of Lahore, where motorcyclists opened fire on his car. Javed Butt, a resident of Iqbal Town, was killed in the attack, while his wife sustained serious injuries and was taken to the hospital for immediate medical attention.—RT/Agency

"We Are Afraid": Israeli Strike Kills Gaza Civil Emergency Service Director

Cairo: An Israeli airstrike on a house in Jabalia on Sunday killed Mohammad Morsi, deputy director of the Gaza Civil Emergency Service in the northern areas of the Gaza Strip, and four of his family, health officials said.



The Civil Emergency Service said in a statement that Morsi's death raised to 83 the number of its members killed by Israeli fire since Oct 7. There was no immediate Israeli comment on Morsi's death. Residents said Israeli forces had also blown up several houses in the Zeitoun suburb of Gaza City 5 km from Jabalia. Medical teams said they were unable to answer desperate calls by some of the residents who had reported being trapped inside their houses, some wounded. "We hear constant bombing in Zeitoun, we know they are blowing up houses there, we don't sleep because of the sounds of explosions, the roaring of tanks sound close and the drones don't stop circling," said one resident of Gaza City, who lives around 1 km away. "The occupation is wiping out Zeitoun, we are afraid about the people trapped in there," he told Reuters via a chat app, refusing to be named. Later on Sunday, the Gaza health ministry said Israeli military strikes across the enclave killed at least 15 people. Residents of central and southern Gaza areas reported intrusion in internet and communication services, which the Palestinian Telecommunication Company said was because of "the ongoing (Israeli) aggression."

Palestinians say internet and communication outages, the first in months, impact the ability of medical staffers to dispatch ambulances to bombed areas and make it difficult for people to check on their relatives or report attacks. Israel and Hamas continued to blame one another for the failure of mediators, including Qatar, Egypt and the U.S., to broker a ceasefire. The U.S. is preparing to present a new proposal, but the prospects of a breakthrough appear dim as gaps between the sides' positions remain large. Meanwhile on Sunday the United Nations, in collaboration with local health authorities, extended by a day a campaign to vaccinate children in the southern Gaza Strip against polio before it moves on Monday to the north. The campaign aims to vaccinate 640,000 children in Gaza after its first polio case in around 25 years. Limited pauses in the fighting have allowed the campaign to proceed. U.N. officials said they were making progress, having reached more than half of the children needing the drops in the first two stages in the southern and central Gaza Strip. A second round will be required four weeks after the first. The latest bloodshed in the decades-old Israeli-Palestinian conflict was triggered on Oct 7 when the Hamas group attacked Israel, killing 1,200 and taking about 250 hostages, according to Israeli tallies.—Agency

China Woman Claims Her Son Developed Vitiligo After Being Slapped By Teacher



A woman in China has claimed that her 11-year-old son, Liu, developed vitiligo, a condition causing white patches on the skin, after being slapped by his teacher. The teacher's harsh punishment was for not completing his mathematics homework, the South China Morning Post reported. Liu, a student at Yifu Primary School, told his mother that his teacher humiliated him by bringing him to the front of the classroom, and then slapped him three times on the right side of his face and once on the left. Following the incident, Liu's mother, surnamed Huang, noticed severe swelling on her son's face and took him to the hospital for medical attention. Three months after the incident, Liu began to exhibit a distressing physical symptom: the loss of pigmentation in certain areas of his skin. Although the exact causes of vitiligo are still not fully understood, research suggests that environmental stress factors, such as physical or emotional trauma, may play a role in triggering the onset of the condition. The school is currently awaiting the outcome of a police investigation and a forensic injury assessment, which will inform their decision on disciplinary actions against the teacher responsible for the incident. The teacher's identity, including their gender, has not been disclosed. Meanwhile, Liu's mother has expressed frustration at being unable to contact the teacher or receive reimbursement for her son's medical expenses, despite the hospital having sent the bill to the teacher. Research from the National Institutes of Health reveals that individuals with vitiligo are more likely to experience anxiety or depression. On social media, the incident has sparked outrage and many users demanded strict punishment against the teacher. One user wrote, "How could a teacher hurt a student so badly without receiving any punishment for three months?" Another said, "Slapping a boy in the face is a step too far." Notably, China's law bans teachers from inflicting corporal punishments on students. However, incidents of teachers abusing students continue to be a massive problem. Last year, a nine-year-old girl underwent emergency surgery for a severely damaged skull, after a teacher allegedly used a metal ruler to hit her on the head. The teacher, identified as Song Mouming, was employed at Bocai Meixihu Primary School in Hunan province, central China. He was arrested by the local police after the incident.—Agency

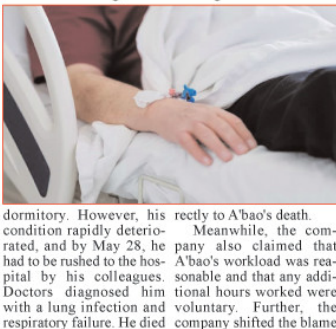
Roof Collapse At Madrasa Results In Two Deaths And Ten Injuries

HARIPUR: The newly constructed roof of a girls' madrasa located in Model Town collapsed, resulting in the death of two female students and two others, media reported on Sunday.

The injured have been moved to the week ago and even the trauma center, where an emergency has been opened. Rescue 1122 is conducting a search operation in the debris, and efforts to remove the debris are underway.—RT/Agency

Chinese Man Dies From Organ Failure After Working For 104 Days With Only 1 Day Off

In a tragic incident that highlights the devastating effects of overwork, a 30-year-old Chinese man died from organ failure after a grueling 104-day work stretch with only one day of rest. According to the South China Morning Post, the man identified as A'bao, who worked as a painter, contracted a pneumococcal infection leading to his death in June 2023. Notably, A'bao had entered into a contractual agreement with a company in February last year, committing to work on a project until January of this year.



Following the signing of the contract, A'bao was assigned to a work project located in Zhoushan, a city in the eastern Chinese province of Zhejiang. He then embarked on an exhausting work schedule, working every day for 104 consecutive days from February to May last year, with only one day of rest on April 6. On May 25, he finally took a sick day, feeling unwell and spending the day resting in his dormitory. However, his condition rapidly deteriorated, and by May 28, he had to be rushed to the hospital by his colleagues. Doctors diagnosed him with a lung infection and respiratory failure. He died on June 1. After his death, his family filed a lawsuit against his employer, alleging gross negligence. The legal action came after social security officials controversially ruled that A'bao's death could not be classified as a work-related injury, citing the timing of his death as the reason. However, his family argued that the prolonged period of excessive work and lack of rest contributed directly to A'bao's death. Meanwhile, the company also claimed that A'bao's workload was reasonable and that any additional hours worked were voluntary. Further, the company shifted the blame to A'bao's pre-existing health conditions and alleged that his failure to seek timely medical attention aggravated his situation. However, a Chinese court ruled in favour of the painter's family, holding A'bao's employer 20% liable for his death. The court found that A'bao died from multiple organ failure due to a pneumococcal infection, often linked to a weakened immune system.—Agency

Rupee Faces Potential Pressure Amid Uncertainty Over IMF Bailout

KARACHI: The Pakistani rupee is anticipated to face pressure, potentially exceeding 279 per dollar due to uncertainties surrounding the International Monetary Fund's (IMF) loan programme, a report said.



The government is exploring various options to bridge the external financing gap, crucial to obtaining final approval for a \$7 billion loan from the IMF. Rollovers pose a significant challenge for the government. In addition to ongoing negotiations with bilateral partners, the government is actively seeking commercial loans from international banks and investors. The finance minister is tasked with a difficult job of closing the funding gap at favourable rates within a limited timeframe to ensure timely approval from the IMF board. Although the government is still optimistic that funding can be obtained soon, any further delays in the loan programme could cause financial markets to become uneasy. The rupee witnessed some fluctuations in the interbank market this week. On Monday, the local currency finished at 278.64 per dollar, on Wednesday, it ended at 278.76 after further declines. On Friday, though, it gained momentum and closed at 278.50 to the dollar. "The rupee will benefit from the 9% drop in oil with Brent trading around the \$71 level," said Tresmak in a client note. "Going forward, the outlook looks stable for the rupee but its likeliness of breaching 279/\$ at any point has increased due to uncertainty around the IMF programme. For now, forward traders are expecting a 100-basis point interest rate drop due to a notable decline in inflation.—RT/Agency

Sudden Gas Outage Affects Several Areas Of Karachi

KARACHI: A sudden gas outage has affected multiple areas of Karachi, further worsening the ongoing gas crisis in the city, local media reported on Sunday. The shortage in the Sui Southern Gas Company (SSGC) system has intensified, leaving residents in areas such as Manzoor Colony, Chanesar Goth, PECHS Society, and Gulshan-e-Iqbal without gas for two hours. Other affected areas include New Karachi, Orangi, Landhi, Malir, Baloch Colony, and Karsaz. Additionally, residents in Liaquatabad, Keamari, and Khawaja Ajmer Nagri are also experiencing similar gas outages. The disruption has impacted both domestic and commercial consumers, particularly on a holiday, causing significant inconvenience. According to authorities, a power failure at the Naimat Basal plant on Saturday night disrupted the gas supply to SSGC. The plant typically produces 160 MMCFD of gas to SSGC; however, only 57 MMCFD has been restored so far, with efforts underway to recover the remaining 103 MMCFD. Efforts are being made to fully restore the gas supply as soon as possible.—RT/Agency

Separately, Pakistan's sugar imports in the first month of the current financial year saw a significant decline, dropping by 44.90% compared to the same period last year. In July, the country imported 280 metric tons of sugar valued at \$0.297 million, compared to 574 metric tons worth \$0.539 million in the corresponding month of the previous year, according to the Pakistan Bureau of Statistics. Additionally, the imports of edible oils, including soybean and palm oil, have also decreased by 93.20% and 13.99%, respectively, compared to the same period last year.—RT/Agency

Former Federal Minister Nisar Memon Urges National Commitment To Literacy On International Literacy Day

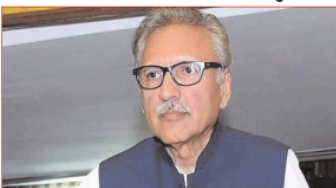

Karachi Records 5,960 Street Crime Incidents In August

KARACHI: Karachi has experienced a surge in street crime, with 5,960 incidents reported in August alone, according to media reports. The Citizens-Police Liaison Committee (CPLC) also highlighted three cases of kidnapping for ransom and six cases of extortion. Earlier, on August 10, police reported that over 44,000 street crime incidents were recorded in Karachi during the first seven months of 2024, with Motorcycles were particularly targeted, with 656 stolen at gunpoint and 3,385 reported stolen overall. Additionally, 1,737 mobile phones were either stolen or snatched during this period. Despite the high number of incidents, recovery rates remain low. Police reports indicate that only 1,500 motorcycles, 220 cars, and 120 mobile phones have been recovered so far, leaving residents concerned about the rising insecurity in the metropolis.—RT/Agency

Alvi Apologises For Sharing Old Video Of PTI Rally

KARACHI: Former president and PTI leader Dr. Arif Alvi has issued an apology after sharing an old video on X (formerly Twitter), claiming it showed the PTI's convoy heading to Islamabad. In his statement, Alvi admitted to mistakenly sharing a video from a different occasion. He stated, "After a fact-check, I have deleted two posts as they were from a previous event. I apologise for the error. Social media is too vast to control, but error corrections are necessary to manage it." It is noteworthy that the

Sindh To Establish 3,000 Non-Formal Education Centers For Out-Of-School Children

The event, organized by the Directorate of Literacy and Non-Formal Education, featured key figures including Sindh School Education Secretary Zahid Ali Abbasi, social activist Shehbaz Roy, and JICA representatives. The focus was on promoting multilingual education and integrating native languages into the curriculum to enhance learning. The new non-formal education centers will operate in high-demand areas and offer flexible hours to accommodate children's needs. A new curriculum, commensurate with middle school standards, was also unveiled at the event. Officials stressed the need for improved educational priorities and funding, emphasizing that only 2% of the GDP is currently allocated to education. The event concluded with commendation shields awarded to education organizations for their contributions.—RT/Agency

Dar Accuses PTI's Policies Of Fueling Terrorism And Economic Woes

ISLAMABAD: With the country engaged in retaliatory measures following a recent spate of attacks, Senator Ishaq Dar alleged on Sunday that the Pakistan Tehreek-e-Insaf (PTI) government's policy of 'appeasing and rehabilitating' extremist groups contributed to the resurgence of terrorism.

Dar, who is the Deputy Prime Minister and also the Foreign Minister of the country, made these remarks during an interaction with British lawmakers of Pakistani origin at a dinner hosted by the High Commissioner Dr Mohammad Faisal at the Pakistan House in London, said a statement issued today.

The dinner was attended by the Deputy Speaker House of Commons Nusrat Ghani, Yasmin Qureshi (MP), Lord Qurban Hussain, Baroness Nosheen Mubarak, Lord Zameer Chaudhry, Baroness Sayeeda Warsi, Baroness Shaista Gohir, Mohammad Afzal Khan (MP), Naseem Shah (MP), Imran Hussain (MP), Tahir Ali (MP), Zubair Ahmed (MP), Adnan Hussain (MP), Mohammad Yasin (MP) and Ayoub Khan (MP).

Dar informed the audience that during the Pakistan Muslim League-Nawaz (PML-N) government from 2013 to 2017, terrorism was



contained at an immense cost of blood and national exchequer.

However, the previous government's policy of appeasing and rehabilitating extremist groups, such as the Tehreek-e-Taliban (TTP), and the release of over 100 hardened terrorists, led to a resurgence of terrorism, he noted.

The nation has been reeling under rising violent attacks since the Taliban rulers returned to power in Afghanistan in 2021, particularly in the bordering provinces of Khyber Pakhtunkhwa (KP) and Balochistan.

The two most vulnerable provinces saw a sharp rise in deadly attacks last month, according to data from the Pakistan Institute for Peace Studies (PIPS).

The digital database of security incidents managed by the Islamabad-based think-tank suggested an alarming situation as the number of attacks jumped from 38 in July to 59 in August. These incidents included 29 attacks in KP, 28 in Balochistan, and two in Punjab.

The most recent and deadliest among the 28 attacks in the southwestern province resulted in 57 deaths and injuries to another 84 people.

Meanwhile, the deputy premier briefed the British Pakistani lawmakers on the government's roadmap to economic revival.

He recalled that during the Nawaz Sharif-led government from 2013 to 2017, Pakistan had grown to the world's 24th-largest economy and was projected to be-

come a member of the G20. "However, political instability, beginning in 2018, had derailed Pakistan's economic trajectory," he regretted.

Dar stressed that the government was committed to putting Pakistan back on the road to economic growth and development that the country had been charting in 2017.

"The difficult and politically unpopular measures taken by the recent government are now beginning to bear fruit," he said, adding that the government has brought down inflation to a single digit and narrowed the current account deficit while stabilising the currency.

was drawing significant foreign investors' interest in Pakistan's energy, mining, IT and agriculture sectors," he added.

The foreign minister also asked the Members of Parliament for suggestions on how the government could draw more British foreign direct investment in Pakistan and increase the bilateral trade volume.

Highlighting Pakistan's recently introduced new visa-free policy to encourage Pakistani expatriates to visit Pakistan, Dar stressed that it was important for young British Pakistanis to stay connected with their roots.

Referring to Imran Khan-founded party, the Deputy PM said that there could be no question of engaging with those who "attacked state institutions and used international forums to undermine the national interest."

He also vowed that the government would not allow any internal or external elements, intent on fomenting political instability, to derail Pakistan's journey to development and prosperity.

Dar also thanked the British Parliamentarians for raising the issue of atrocities inflicted upon the innocent people of Indian Illegally Occupied Jammu & Kashmir (IIOJ&K) and the people of Gaza.—RT/Agency

Shehbaz Pledges To Eradicate Polio Through Collective Efforts

ISLAMABAD: Prime Minister Muhammad Shehbaz Sharif on Sunday reaffirmed his commitment to making Pakistan polio-free, stating that with collective efforts, the disease will be completely eradicated and prevented from re-emerging in the future, ensuring a healthier future for the nation's children.

Speaking at the ceremony after launching the 7-day polio eradication campaign, the prime minister stressed that a unified approach and collaborative efforts are crucial to successfully tackling the polio challenge and achieving a polio-free Pakistan.

At the ceremony, the prime minister extended a warm welcome to the attendees and expressed his appreciation for the outstanding collaboration and tireless efforts of federal and provincial government staff, foot soldiers, and security offi-



cers, who have worked together seamlessly to drive the polio eradication campaign forward.

Asif Accuses Imran Of Failing To Condemn Israeli Actions Against Palestinians

ISLAMABAD: After an Israeli publication suggested PTI founder Imran Khan could reveal Pakistan's stance on Israel, Defence Minister Khawaja Asif, in a jibe at the jailed leader, claimed the former premier never openly condemned Israeli barbarism against Palestinians.

The defence czar was referring to an opinion piece in The Times of Israel titled "An Unlikely Ally: How Imran Khan Could Shape Israeli-Pakistani Relations," which prompted Khan's political opponents to accuse him of compromising Pakistan's long-standing stance against Israel.

"Israeli media has written in favour of the PTI founder," said Asif while speaking to media, adding, "[...] which endangers our [national] image as Pakistan has an important position in the Muslim world."

The publication highlighted that the ex-premier, who ruled the country from 2018 to 2022 before being ousted from office via a no-confidence motion, had "publicly maintained Pakistan's traditional support for the Palestinian cause" and "dismissed the idea of normalising relations with Israel". However, Imran's "pragmatic approach" to foreign relations during his tenure suggested that he "may have been more open to reevaluating Pakistan's position on Israel than his public statements indicated", it read.



Asif alleged that the publication confirmed Imran's "political adoption" by the Israeli media and termed him "a product of Zionism".

He went on to say that the PTI founder had always attempted to damage the national image. Pointing towards the blog, Asif said that "Imran is standing with the Zionist butchers" amid the massacre of Palestinians in Gaza.

The federal minister also blamed Imran for "misguiding the Pakistani youth" and appealed to the PTI founder's supporters to thoroughly analyse the ex-premier's objectives. The blog also claimed that "Imran's close relationship with the Goldsmith family plays a significant role in understanding his potential shift in stance towards Israel". The Israeli media's publication sees Imran's support for Zac in the London mayoral polls as his "loyalty to the [Goldsmith] family and their broader network, which in turn has supported him in the past".

The ruling Pakistan Muslim League-Nawaz

(PML-N) senior leader slammed the cricket-turned-politician for "campaigning for a Jew instead of a Muslim" in London mayoral elections.

Asif was pointing towards Khan's campaigning for Zac Goldsmith, brother of his former wife Jemima Goldsmith, in 2016 against mayoral candidate Sadiq Khan.

It is worth mentioning that Labour Party's Sadiq had defeated Zac from the UK's Conservative Party by nearly half a million votes to become the first Muslim mayor of London. The online newspaper also urged Israel and its allies to ensure that "Imran is free again to participate in Pakistani politics" as the politico's "unique position, relationships, and strategic thinking could influence Israeli-Pakistani relations".

The 71-year-old former prime minister has been in prison for more than a year after he was booked in a plethora of cases, including the Toshakhana case, cipher case, and the un-Islamic marriage case.—RT/Agency

PPP Assembles Lawyers In Islamabad To Discuss Judicial Bills

ISLAMABAD: Pakistan People's Party has summoned its legal experts in Islamabad to consider over the judiciary related bills in the parliament.

The party's chairman Bilawal Bhutto Zardari has also proceeded to Islamabad from Karachi, sources said.

Former Senate chairman Farooq H. Naik, Sindh's law minister and other law experts have been summoned to Islamabad, sources said.

The PPP intends to thorough review of the legislation related to the judiciary.

The party leadership will hold a meeting in federal capital Islamabad next week.

It is to be mentioned here that recently bills seek-



ing to enhance Supreme Court's bench strength introduced in the National Assembly and the Senate.

Independent Senator Abdul Qadir presented "The Supreme Court (Number of Judges) Amendment Bill, 2024" in the upper house to increase the number of apex court judges to 21.

A bill tabled in the lower house, by PML-N parliamentarian Daniyal Chaudhry called for increasing the number of judges to 23. Both bills pointed out called for increasing the number of judges in the apex court to deal with a significant backlog of cases.—RT/Agency

amendments in NAB regulations, which received clearance from Hameed. He criticised Khan for not engaging in political dialogue despite offers from Shehbaz Sharif.—RT/Agency

Pakistani Forces Kill Eight Afghan Taliban In Retaliation For Border Attack



ISLAMABAD: Afghan Taliban once again resorted to unprovoked aggression on the Pakistan-Afghanistan border and Pakistani forces, in a befitting response, killed eight Afghan Taliban.

According to sources, Afghan Taliban opened unprovoked firing with heavy weapons yesterday from inside Afghanistan, targeting Pakistani check posts.

The Pakistan security forces responded effec-

tively and killed eight Afghan Taliban, including key commanders Khalil and Jan Muhammad. Sixteen Afghan Taliban were also injured in the firing.

The facilitation of terrorist attacks against Pakistan is no secret. In addition to terrorist attacks, the Afghan Taliban's aggression on the international border is now openly visible.—RT/Agency

Hafiz Naem Criticizes Political Elites And Launches National Membership Campaign

KARACHI: Jamaat-e-Islami (JI) Chief Hafiz Naemur Rehman criticised both the ruling and opposition parties for their focus on personal wealth accumulation rather than addressing the country's core issues.

Speaking at a rally in Karachi on Sunday as part of JI's nationwide membership campaign, Rehman argued that the political elite are indifferent to critical issues such as water, electricity, gas, and fuel shortages. He asserted that these problems require decisive action to address the "crumbling walls" of the current system.

The JI chief denounced the current ruling class, which he described as comprising feudal lords, capitalists, and dictatorial figures, who he claimed have amassed significant wealth without being taxed. He also criticised the government for its agreements with Independent Power Producers (IPPs), which he said have burdened the public.

Rehman stated that JI represents the strongest voice



for Pakistan's poor and is actively mobilising its base through a campaign aimed at securing five million new members across the country.

He called for a unified effort against what he termed a "tyrannical system" and promised to continue advocating for the public even if it meant taking the struggle to Islamabad.

The JI chief recalled the party's past success in Bangladesh, where it had played a significant role in challenging local authorities, and urged that Pakistan avoid a similar crisis.

He further criticised the Pakistan People's Party (PPP)

for corruption and mismanagement, particularly in Sindh. He claimed that despite Karachi contributing significantly to provincial revenue, the local government spends the budget on lavish expenses rather than on the city's needs.

He accused the PPP of exploiting the people of Sindh and failing to decentralise power as required by Article 140-A of the constitution. Moreover, Rehman condemned the alleged establishment's support for corrupt political figures and urged respect for democratic processes and public opinion.—RT/Agency

Naqvi Demands Report On Stone-Pelting At Police During PTI Rally

ISLAMABAD: Interior Minister Mohsin Naqvi took notice of unfortunate incident of stone-pelting at police officers by the PTI workers during the Islamabad rally on Sunday.

He sought a detailed report from the Inspector General of Islamabad Police to review the circumstances surrounding the attack.

The interior minister also contacted the injured Senior Superintendent of Police (SSP) Shoab Khan by telephone to inquire about his health.

Mohsin Naqvi also directed the authorities con-



cerned to provide the best medical treatment to the injured police officials.

Earlier, the capital police have launched a crackdown on the PTI workers as the deadline for the Islamabad rally ended.

Many police officers were injured when the PTI protesters started pelting stones.
