18 Indian-Backed Militants Sent To Hell In Balochistan Sweep

QUETTA: At least 18 Indian-sponsored terrorists were killed on Wednesday in three separate intelligence-based operations (IBOs) conducted by Pakistani security forces across Balochistan, according to security sources.

The first operation took place in the Gaza Band area on the outskirts of Quetta on the reported presence of terrorists.

During the operation, security forces effectively engaged the Fitna-al-Khawarij location, and after an intense fire exchange, 10 Indian sponsored khawarij were killed. Two security personnel sustained injuries during the operation.

In two other operations carried out in the Zhoob and Sherani districts, 8 more terrorists were killed.



Security forces also recovered a heavy cache of weapons and ammunition from the killed terrorists, who remained actively involved in numerous terrorist activities in these areas.

The security forces of Pakistan are determined to wipeout the menace of Indian sponsored terrorism from the country, and reaffirm the nation's unwavering

resolve to bring the perpetrators of terrorism to justice.

Earlier, at least five militants were killed, including a suicide bomber, in an attack claimed to be orchestrated by Indian proxy network "Fitna al-Hindustan," in Quetta, Balochistan, on Tuesday.

The suicide blast was reported near Jinnah Road in Quetta.—RT/Agency

US Pledges Qatar Security Shield After Israeli Strikes

US: The United States will regard "any armed attack" on Qatari territory as a threat to Washington and will provide the Gulf Arab state with security guarantees, the White House said, after an Israeli strike on the country last month.



In light of the continuing threats to the State of Qatar posed by foreign aggression, it is the policy of the United States to guarantee the security and territorial integrity of the State of Qatar against external attack," said an Ex-

ecutive Order signed by US President Donald Trump.

In the event of an attack

on Qatar, the United States will "take all lawful and appropriate measures — including diplomatic, economic, and, if necessary, military — to defend the interests of the United States and of the State of Qatar and to restore peace and stability," the order said.

The agreement comes after an Israeli strike on the key US regional ally on September 9, targeting officials from the Palestinian group Hamas who were discussing a US peace proposal for the war in Gaza.

Israeli Prime Minister Benjamin Netanyahu called Qatar's prime minister from the White House on Monday, apologising for strikes and promising not to do so again, the United States said.

Netanyahu was in Washington to meet Trump, and had until then been defiant since ordering the September 9 strikes.

Qatar is a key US ally in the Gulf and hosts the largest US military base in the region at al-Udeid, which also includes a regional headquarters for elements of US Central Command.—RT/Agency

PML-N And PPP Call Truce After Maryam Nawaz Row

ISLAMABAD: The Pakistan Muslim League-Nawaz (PML-N) and the Pakistan Peoples Party (PPP) have agreed to end their recent war of words after tensions flared over Punjab Chief Minister Maryam Nawaz's speeches, sources said on Wednesday.

A PPP delegation met PML-N leaders in National Assembly Speaker Sardar Ayaz Sadiq's chamber to defuse the situation.

The PML-N side included Deputy Prime Minister Ishaq Dar, Rana Sanaullah, Azam Nazeer Tarar, Tariq Fazal Chaudhry and Rana Mubashir, while the PPP was represented by Naveed Qamar and Ejaz Jakhani.

During the meeting, PPP leaders voiced objections to Maryam's recent remarks, including her criticism of



the controversy erupted last week after Maryam accused PPP leaders of politicising floods in Punjab during the launch of an electric bus service in Dera Ghazi Khan. PPP leaders hit back strongly, with some from Sindh publicly criticising the Punjab chief minister.—RT/Agency

PPP's handling of flood politics in Punjab and her warning that she would "break the finger" raised against her province.

Naveed Qamar cautioned that negative statements between coalition partners hurt both consensus and governance, urging restraint from both sides.

Khuzdar Shocker: 4 Terrorists In Women's Attire Nabbed In Daring IBO



KHUZDAR: Security forces conducted an intelligence-based operation (IBO) in Khuzdar, successfully thwarting terrorists' attempt to flee, the Inter-Services Public Relations (ISPR) said on Wednesday.

According to the military media wing, "on 1 October 2025, security forces conducted an intelligence-based operation in Khuzdar District of Balochistan, on reported presence of terrorists belonging to Indian proxy, Fitna al-Hindustan."

During the conduct of operation, own forces apprehended four IS trying to flee cowardly by disguising in women attire. Weapons and ammunition was also recovered from the terrorists, who remained actively involved in numerous terrorist activities in the area.

Sanitization operation is being conducted to eliminate any other terrorist found in the area, as the security forces of Pakistan are determined to wipeout the menace of Indian sponsored terrorism from the country, and reaffirm the nation's unwavering resolve to bring the perpetrators of terrorism to justice.

FinMin Shuts Door On New Taxes As IMF Talks Show Promise

ISLAMABAD: Finance Minister Muhammad Aurangzeb has made it clear that no additional tax measures are under consideration at present.

Speaking to the media in Islamabad, Aurangzeb expressed determination to achieve the target of raising the tax-to-GDP ratio to 11 per cent. He made it clear that no additional tax measures are under consideration at present.

He mentioned that several tax cases are pending in the courts and that progress in these cases is expected to improve tax collection.

The FinMin said that negotiations with the International Monetary Fund (IMF) were progressing well.

Earlier, in a meeting of the Senate Standing Committee on Finance chaired by Senator Salim Mandiwala, the finance minister said that macroeconomic stability has been restored. The finance czar announced that the government plans to issue \$250



million in Panda bonds by the end of November, with a total of \$1 billion to be issued gradually.

Aurangzeb added that the budget for the next fiscal year will not be prepared by the Federal Board of Revenue (FBR). Instead, the Tax Policy Office within the Ministry of Finance will take responsibility for the new budget. The Tax Policy Office is being activated and will consult on the budget throughout the year.

has indicated plans to hold an investor conference in Washington this month.

Aurangzeb said the conference aimed to boost US investment in the energy, mining and technology sectors, adding that three global rating agencies have raised Pakistan's rating. The improvement is based on better financial management and increased income, the finance minister added. He maintained that the sectors open for investment in Pakistan are clearly defined.—RT/Agency

US Govt Shutdown Grips Washington As Partisan Rift Deepens

WASHINGTON: The US government shut down much of its operations on Wednesday as deep partisan divisions prevented Congress and the White House from reaching a funding deal, setting off what could be a long, grueling standoff that could lead to the loss of thousands of federal jobs.



There was no clear path out of the impasse, while agencies warned that the 15th government shutdown since 1981 would halt the release of a closely watched September employment report, slow air travel, suspend scientific research, withhold pay from US troops and lead to the furlough of 750,000 federal workers at a daily cost of

\$400 million.

Trump, whose campaign to radically reshape the federal government is already on track to push out some 300,000 workers by December, warned congressional Democrats that a shutdown could clear the path for "irreversible" ac-

tions, including cutting more jobs and programmes. The shutdown is commenced hours after the Senate rejected a short-term spending measure that would have kept government operations afloat through November 21.—RT/Agency

Pentagon Charts Exit Plan To Scale Down Iraq Mission



WASHINGTON: The Pentagon recommitted itself in a statement on Tuesday to scaling back its military mission in Iraq, a process that a US official said will see Baghdad command efforts to combat remnants of Daesh inside its own country.

Under the plan, the US and its coalition allies would instead focus on combating Daesh remnants in Syria and shift most of their personnel to Iraq's Kurdistan region to carry out that mission, the official said, speaking on condition of anonymity.

The US had approximately 2,500 troops in Iraq at the start of 2025 and more than 900 in neighbouring Syria as part of the coalition formed in 2014 to combat Daesh as it rampaged through the two countries.

Once the transitions are completed, the total number of US forces in Iraq will

number fewer than 2,000, and the majority of them will be in Erbil, the official said.

A final number has yet to be determined, the official added, without offering a timeline.

US troops remaining in Baghdad will focus on normal bilateral security co-operation issues, not the counter-ISIS fight.

"ISIS is no longer posing a sustained threat to the government of Iraq or to the US homeland from Iraqi territory. This is a major achievement that enables us to transition more responsibly to Iraq leading efforts for security in their own country," a senior defence official said.

The agreement is a boost for the government in Baghdad, which has long worried that US troops can be a magnet for instability, frequently targeted by Iran-aligned groups.—RT/Agency

Saudi Crown Prince Set For High-Stakes Pakistan Visit

ISLAMABAD: Saudi Arabia's Crown Prince and Prime Minister Mohammed bin Salman bin Abdulaziz Al Saud is expected to visit Pakistan before December 31, 2025, citing Foreign Ministry sources.



According to the sources, the exact dates of the visit are currently being finalized. During the visit, several key agreements between Pakistan and Saudi Arabia are likely to be signed.

Crown Prince Mohammed bin Salman accepted an invitation from Prime Minister Shehbaz Sharif, and a senior official from the Foreign Ministry confirmed that the visit will take place before the end of the year. Bilateral ties between Pakistan and Saudi Arabia have significantly en-

hanced in recent months, particularly following the signing of a Strategic Mutual Defense Agreement during Prime Minister Shehbaz Sharif's visit to the Kingdom.

The agreement states that "any aggression against either country shall be considered an aggression against both." "This agreement, which reflects the shared commitment of both nations to enhance their security and

to achieving security and peace in the region and the world, aims to develop aspects of defense cooperation between the two countries and strengthen joint deterrence against any aggression. Hamas Pushes To Rewrite Trump Plan Disarmament Clause

DOHA, Qatar: Hamas officials want amendments to clauses on disarmament in US President Donald Trump's Gaza peace plan, a Palestinian source close to the group's leadership told AFP on Wednesday.



Hamas negotiators held discussions Tuesday with Turkish, Egyptian and Qatari officials in Doha, the source said, requesting anonymity to discuss sensitive matters and adding the group needed "two or three days at most" to respond.

Trump's plan, backed by

Israeli Prime Minister Benjamin Netanyahu, calls for a ceasefire, the release of hostages by Hamas within 72 hours, the group's disarmament and a gradual Israeli withdrawal from Gaza.

But the Palestinian source said: "Hamas wants to amend some of the clauses such as

the one on disarmament and the expulsion of Hamas and faction cadres." Hamas leaders also want "international guarantees for a full Israeli withdrawal from the Gaza Strip" and guarantees of no assassinations inside or outside the territory. Six people were killed in an Israeli attack on Hamas officials meeting in Doha to discuss an earlier ceasefire proposal last month. The source said Hamas was also in touch with "other regional and Arab parties", without giving details.—RT/Agency

THUL: A tragic incident occurred in Sudurabad, Thul, where two minor sisters reportedly collapsed after receiving a cancer prevention vaccine administered by a health department team. As per initial reports, the girls Sumera and Nasiman, daughters of Ilyas Burro were vaccinated at their home. Soon after, both girls lost consciousness and were rushed to a private hospital in Sukkur in critical condition. According to hospital sources, 14-year-old Sumera could not survive despite medical efforts and was pronounced dead during treatment. Her younger sister, Nasiman, remains under intensive care due to her deteriorating condition. The body of the deceased was transferred to Taluka Hospital Thul for post-mortem, and later handed over to the family. Health officials have yet to issue

a formal statement. The incident has sparked grief and concern in the area. According to statements from the family, they were unaware of any potential side effects and claim they were not informed about any risks. The grieving parents have demanded an impartial investigation into the matter and called for justice. Further investigation is underway to determine the cause of the reaction and to verify the vaccine administered.

HESCO Cracks Whip: Rs 63 Crores Recovered, Thousands of Power Thieves Disconnected

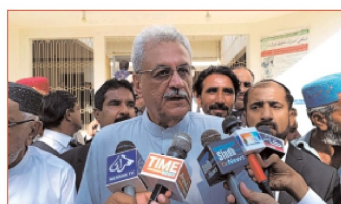

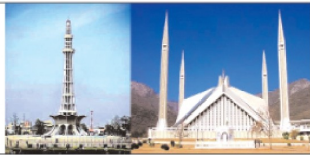
Bloody Shootout: Two Robbers Downed, One Escapes in Fierce Police Encounter

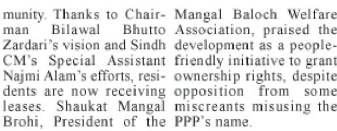

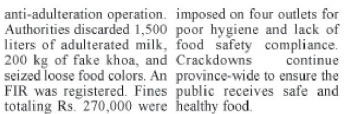

Once again, Quetta has witnessed blood and fire. The cowardly suicide blast near the Frontier Corps headquarters that martyred ten, followed within hours by a ferocious clash in Aghbarg where the Counter-Terrorism Department gunned down ten heavily armed militants, is a chilling reminder of the enemy we face. These are no ragtag militants. They are well-funded, highly trained, and directed by foreign hands desperate to destabilize Pakistan. moralized. They want Pakistanis to lose faith in

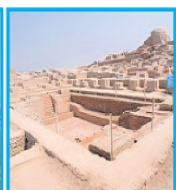

A splendid all-round display saw India launch their ICC Women's World Cup campaign on the front foot, brushing aside Sri Lanka by 59 runs in the curtain-raiser in Guwahati on Tuesday.

Half-centuries from Deepthi Sharma and Amanjot Kaur steadied the ship as India posted a competitive 269 for eight in a contest reduced by rain to 47 overs a side.

Sri Lanka, chasing under lights, had a flying start at 82 for one in 15 overs, with skipper Chamari Athapaththu cutting and pulling anything loose in a rollicking 43 off 47 balls.

But once the spinners were tossed the ball, the wheels came off spectacularly.

The big breakthrough arrived when Deepthi, on song with ball in hand, sent down a full delivery that skidded straight on to castle Athapaththu, leaving Sri Lanka's middle order exposed once more and underlining their heavy reliance on the talismanic skipper.

India had their own jitters. At 124 for six they were staring down the barrel as veteran Inoka Kanawera turned the game on its head. The 39-year-old left-arm spinner bowled an impeccable line prising out three wickets in an over.—Agency

Pakistan's Sardar Tariq Ahmad Creates History with Triple Ironman Triumph

LAHORE: Sardar Tariq Ahmad has etched his name in Pakistan's sporting history by becoming the first Pakistani to complete three Ironman 70.3 races in just 11 weeks. His remarkable journey spanned the Ironman 70.3 Jonköping European Championship in Sweden (July 6), Ironman 70.3 Hradec Králové in the Czech Republic (August 17), and Ironman 70.3 Belgrade in Serbia (September 21).

Across 77 days, Ahmad



conquered the grueling 1.9 km swim, 90 km cycling, and 21.1 km run three times, proving Pakistan's endurance potential on the global stage. He dedicated the achievement to discipline, perseverance, and inspiring young Pakistani athletes to chase international dreams.—RT

Frank Admits Spurs Still Lack a Reliable XI Before Leeds Clash



Thomas Frank has confessed that he still does not have a 'go-to' starting eleven as Tottenham Hotspur prepares to face Leeds United, stating that rotation is essential while settling in with new players.

Frank made the comments after Spurs were held to a 2-2 draw against Bodo Glimt in the Champions League, as his side struggled at times against an aggressive opponent.

The 51-year-old admitted that his players found it difficult to cope with the Norwegian intensity and that finding a settled line-up would take time.

During a press conference, Frank explained his approach and added that identifying a preferred

eleven was 'something I am looking into' and described the process as normal for a manager.

"I think it's overall, you can say with a lot of games, that go-to starting XI you like to find at a certain stage, that's something I'm looking into, which is normal," Frank said.

"New coach, new players, and we still need to do a little bit of rotation."

In contrast, Manager Daniel Farke has mostly stuck to a regular starting lineup, and Leeds is a formidable opponent thanks to their excellent home record this season, where teams like Everton, Newcastle, and Bournemouth have failed to win.—Agency

Mohsin Naqvi Slams Indian Media Over Fake Apology Narrative in Asia Cup Trophy Row

Asian Cricket Council (ACC) Chairman Mohsin Naqvi, in a strong rebuttal against recent claims circulating in Indian media, denied apologising to the Board of Control for Cricket in India (BCCI) over the Asia Cup trophy presentation row.

Addressing what he called "fabricated, nonsense and cheap propaganda," Naqvi, who also heads the Pakistan Cricket Board, said that Indian media is prioritising misinformation over facts.

"This fabricated nonsense is nothing but cheap propaganda, aimed only at misleading their own people," he posted on X.

"I have done nothing wrong and I have never apologised to the BCCI nor will I ever do so," the ACC chairman added.

He also took a jibe at the "persistent politicisation" of



cricket in India and said, "Unfortunately, India continues to drag politics into cricket, damaging the very spirit of the game."

Naqvi clarified that he was prepared to hand over the trophy on the final day and even today.

"I was ready to hand over the trophy that very day and I am still ready now. If they [India] truly want it [trophy], they are welcome to come to the ACC office and collect it from me," he concluded.

The trophy row followed a series of controversies involving the Indian team during the Asia Cup — from players snubbing handshakes to refusing to receive the trophy from Naqvi.

During a routine ACC meeting in Dubai on Tuesday, the ACC chairman rejected BCCI Vice President Rajeev Shukla's repeated demands to hand over the Asia Cup 2025 trophy, asserting that the silverware should be collected by the Indian skipper in person, the sources told Geo News.

Naqvi responded that the

issue was not part of the meeting's agenda. After further insistence, he remarked that if the Indian team wanted the trophy, its captain should visit the ACC office personally to receive it.

No decision was taken yet on whether the trophy will be handed over to the Indian side.

According to sources close to regional cricket bodies, BCCI officials — who attended the meeting virtually — reacted sharply to Naqvi's stance, demanding instead that the trophy be transferred to the International Cricket Council (ICC) headquarters.

Other ACC members reportedly attempted to defuse tensions, urging Indian officials to show restraint. However, the BCCI delegation abruptly left the meeting and cut its digital feed.—Agency

Saim Ayub Dethrones Pandya as T20I's Top All-Rounder



India's Abhishek Sharma has increased his T20I batting rankings lead, while Pakistan's Saim Ayub has ended Hardik Pandya's T20I all-rounder reign.

The accolades continue to flow for Abhishek Sharma as the India opener broke a record that has lasted for almost five years by reaching the highest-ever rating on the ICC Men's T20I Batter Rankings.

Abhishek reached a rating of 931 points following a stylish half-century during India's successful semi-final victory over Sri Lanka at the Asia Cup and in the process overtook the previous best rating of 919 points, which was achieved by England right-hander Dawid Malan in 2020.

It means Abhishek in-

creases his lead at the top of the rankings for T20I batters, with the left-hander also surpassing the previous best ratings of teammates Suryakumar Yadav and Virat Kohli before he finished the week with a total of 926 rating points.

Abhishek only made his international debut last year, but the 25-year-old has put together an amazing record and was adjudged the Player of the Tournament at the Asia Cup for his total of 314 runs at an average of 44.85.

He now leads England's Phil Salt in second place by a total of 82 rating points, while India teammate Tilak Varma remains in third place on the batter rankings after his 213 runs at the Asia Cup.—Agency

Jonathan Kuminga Seals New Deal with Golden State Warriors



SAN FRANCISCO: Congolese forward Jonathan Kuminga has agreed to a two-year, \$48.5 million deal to return to the Golden State Warriors, the team announced on Tuesday.

According to an ESPN report, the contract includes a team option in the second year, giving the Warriors or any team that might acquire him in a trade the flexibility to restructure or sign a new contract after the 2025-26 campaign.

The Warriors also reached a one-year agreement with free agent guard Seth Curry, who will join his younger brother Stephen Curry as training camps begin on Wednesday.

Negotiations with Kuminga had stretched throughout the offseason, with Warriors general manager Mike Denbury Jr. and Kuminga's representatives

initially at a stalemate. Golden State ultimately increased its two-year offer by \$8 million between July and September, guaranteeing Kuminga roughly \$15 million more than the one-year, \$8 million qualifying offer he was set to receive this season.

Earlier offers included a two-year, \$45 million contract with a team option, and more recently, a three-year, \$75 million proposal.

With Kuminga's situation resolved, Golden State can now move forward in finalising its roster.—Agency

England's Dark Horses Eye World Cup Glory

England captain Nat Sciver-Brunt hopes her team of "outsiders" can thrive at the Women's Cricket World Cup as they seek to end a painful eight-year trophy drought.

The team are one of the best-funded in the women's game but have been overshadowed in recent years by Australia and India.

Since winning the 50-over World Cup at Lord's in 2017, England have fallen short on the global stage, raising questions about their ability to cope under intense pressure.

They were beaten finalists in 2022, losing by 71 runs to Australia despite an impres-



sive 148 not out from Sciver-Brunt.

England have also underperformed at T20 World Cups, losing to South Africa in the semi-finals in 2023 and failing to make it out of the group stage last year. T20 cricket bats.

Earlier this year they were put firmly in their place by reigning world champions Australia and co-hosts India in tournament warm-up matches, though Sciver-Brunt accepts they will still be the teams to beat.

"We were never going to be going in as favourites, that's India and Australia, but not having that label will hopefully free us up," she said.

The expectation of being outsiders will spur us on, I guess, but internally we have certain expectations to put something out that we are proud of and compete against the very best teams.—Agency

Selectors Under Fire Over Asif Afridi's Test Inclusion

Questions are being raised over the sudden inclusion of Asif Afridi, convicted in a corruption case, into the national team at the age of 38. The PCB had imposed a two-year ban on the spinner in February 2023, but it was surprisingly lifted within just one year.

According to details, in 2022, Khyber Pakhtunkhwa's left-arm spinner Asif Afridi was suspended by the PCB for violating the Anti-Corruption Code during the National T20 Cup. In February 2023, he was formally banned for two years, effective from September 12, 2022, the date of his initial suspension. But, in a surprising turn of events, he was allowed back into domestic cricket as early as October 2023.

He was charged with breaching Article 2.4.10 of



the Anti-Corruption Code — "directly or indirectly inducing, persuading, encouraging, inciting, or intentionally facilitating any participant to commit a violation." His second charge was under Article 2.4.4 — failure to report corrupt approaches. For this, he received an additional six-month suspension, which ran concurrently with his two-year ban. Such offenses could have warranted a lifetime ban, but the board adopted a lenient approach.

Two other cricketers were also suspected in this case, and a coach's role was deemed highly questionable, but no further investigations were carried out.

In the KPL, Asif Afridi represented Rawalakot Hawks. Even before the tournament began, organizers had suspicions about him. When the PCB was asked, it replied that Asif was not barred from playing because the board wanted to "get to the root of the matter." In the

first rain-affected match against Jammu Janbaz, he conceded 35 runs in 3 overs with one wicket. Before the next match against Kotli, instructions had already been given to closely monitor him. In that match, Rawalakot lost by 10 wickets. Batting at number three, Asif was bowled out first ball, and with the ball, he gave away 52 runs in 4 overs without taking a wicket. After the match, tournament organizers had a detailed discussion with the PCB Anti-Corruption Unit officer. Shockingly, he was later selected for Khyber Pakhtunkhwa's squad in the National T20 Cup, which drew criticism from certain quarters. Against Central Punjab, he picked 2 wickets for 24 runs, but after that, he wasn't given another game and was again suspended.—Agency

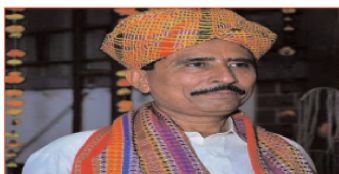

University officials confirmed the disturbance and said security measures on campus have been tightened to prevent further unrest. Police have also been informed about the incident, and an investigation is underway to ascertain the involvement of external groups.—RT/Agency

SBC Calls Strike, Boycotts Courts Over Maryam Nawaz's Remarks

Karachi: The Sindh Bar Council (SBC) has announced a strike and boycott of court proceedings today in protest against remarks made by Punjab Chief Minister Maryam Nawaz. The council demanded that the chief minister withdraw her statements and issue an apology.

Maryam Nawaz's speech in Faisalabad, where she said: "My water, my money—why should anyone object to that?" Punjab gets equal funds under the NFC Award, so those giving advice should keep it to themselves. Where do you spend your share? The begging culture must end now."

SBC representatives condemned the remarks as derogatory and divisive, stressing that such statements undermine inter-provincial harmony. Lawyers in Sindh announced they would not participate in court proceedings until their demand for an apology is met.—RT/Agency

Wifaq-ul-Madaris Bars Online Classes and Exams for Shaven Students

Karachi: In a major decision, Wifaq-ul-Madaris has announced a ban on online education and barred students who shave their beards from appearing in examinations under its system. According to ARY News, the board clarified that any madrasa operating online classes or offering

part-time education must submit a detailed report.

The decision further restricts the release of videos and photographs from official gatherings or events, with office-bearers prohibited from sharing such material publicly. Wifaq-ul-Madaris also confirmed

that it will compile textbooks for primary, sixth, and seventh grades, keeping in view the guidelines of the Textbook Board and other educational bodies.

Officials stressed that the measures aim to uphold traditional values and maintain uniformity in religious education.—RT/Agency

Governor Sindh Launches SME Cell at Governor House

Karachi: Governor Sindh Kamran Khan Tessori has announced the establishment of a dedicated Small and Medium Enterprises (SME) Cell at the Governor House to boost and strengthen the sector. He said work has already begun at a fast pace to empower small businesses, which he termed the backbone of the economy.

Speaking during his visit to the Crown Group Chinese JV Industrial Park in Bin Qasim Town, alongside the Chinese Consul General, the Governor outlined his vision to expand industrial zones across Sindh to create employment and ensure better wages. He said Pakistan's Special Investment Facilitation Council (SIFC) is enabling agreements with foreign partners, assuring Chinese investors that all facilities will be provided within three months.

He stressed that joint ventures with China could generate jobs, transfer technology, and unlock a \$2 billion opportunity. He also announced plans to revisit China in January for further investment talks.—RT

Stolen UK Range Rover Recovered from Karachi's Saddar

KARACHI: A luxury Range Rover stolen from the United Kingdom has been traced to Karachi's Saddar area, according to media reports. The revelation emerged after Interpol Manchester wrote to Sindh Police on the request of UK authorities, seeking assistance in recovering the high-end vehicle. The letter stated that the black Range Rover was stolen from Harrogate on November 22, 2022. Tracking systems later indicated the vehicle's location in Karachi, specifically

in the Saddar locality. UK police shared the exact location details with Pakistani authorities to facilitate the recovery process. Interpol has urged Sindh Police to extend full cooperation in the matter and assist in securing the stolen car. The case highlights the increasing role of international coordination in tracking stolen luxury vehicles, as well as Karachi's emergence as a suspected destination in global vehicle smuggling networks.—RT/Agency

Karachi Mayor Demands Rights, Slams PIDCL's Role

KARACHI: Karachi Mayor Murtaza Wahab has criticized the establishment of the Pakistan Infrastructure Development Company Limited (PIDCL), questioning its relevance and authority in the city. Speaking to the media, he remarked that no one knows who heads the company, highlighting the frequent renaming from KIDCL to SIDCL and now PIDCL.



Wahab pointed out that PIDCL has no operations in Lahore or Peshawar, yet it is active in Karachi, which he said raises concerns of discrimination. "I want my city to get its due rights," he stressed, adding that Karachi's residents need improvements in living conditions rather than symbolic

initiatives such as electric buses. The mayor urged political leaders to avoid unnecessary statements during the current economic challenges and instead focus on solving the public's pressing issues. According to Edhi officials, the incident occurred within the jurisdiction of Yousuf Plaza police station, where unidentified assailants opened fire, injuring Osama, son of Muhammad Sarfraz. He was immediately shifted to Abbasi Shaheed Hospital for treatment.

Police stated that initial investigations suggest the incident took place during an altercation at the petrol pump. However, the exact cause of the dispute has not yet been determined. Law enforcement officials have begun further inquiries to trace the culprits and establish the motive behind the attack. Authorities assured that evidence is being collected and those involved will be brought to justice. The incident has caused panic among local residents, who have called for stricter security measures in the area.—RT/Agency

Saurashtra coast of Gujarat (India), the Met Office said on Wednesday. The system is likely to move westwards, intensify further into a depression during next 12 hours over northeast Arabian Sea and move initially in west/southwest direction.—RT/Agency

Goods Transporters Reject Fuel Hike, Raise Fares by 3%

KARACHI: The Pakistan Goods Transport Alliance has rejected the recent increase in petroleum product prices, declaring it unacceptable.

Alliance President Malik Shahzad Awan said transporters cannot bear further losses, stressing that the frequent hikes in petrol and diesel prices are creating instability within the transport sector.

He announced a 3% increase in fares, warning that transport unions are set to make another major decision soon if the government does not reconsider the price hike. It is to be noted that the federal government announced new petrol prices and diesel prices for the next fortnight.—RT/Agency

Emirates Jet Hit by GPS Signal Disruption Before Karachi Landing

Karachi: An Emirates Airlines flight, EK606, encountered GPS signal disruption just minutes before landing in Karachi's airspace, officials confirmed. The incident occurred late last night when the aircraft was at an altitude of 3,000 feet.

Air Traffic Control (ATC) about the difficulty ATC provided timely guidance and assisted the pilot during the approach, ensuring a safe landing on Runway 25L.

Authorities confirmed that all passengers and crew remained safe, and the flight landed without incident. Aviation experts noted that GPS disruptions, though rare, can

pose serious risks during critical phases of flight such as landing. The Civil Aviation Authority (CAA) is reviewing the case to determine the cause of the disruption and assess whether additional safety measures are needed to prevent similar occurrences in the future.—RT/Agency

Karachi Braces for Hot, Humid Weather Today

Karachi: The city is currently experiencing a temperature of 30°C with humidity levels recorded at 75 percent, according to the Pakistan Meteorological Department (PMD). Winds are blowing from the northeast at a speed of 11 kilometers per hour. The Met Office has forecast that Karachi's maximum temperature today is likely to

remain between 34°C and 36°C. The sky will stay partly cloudy, with the possibility of light rain in some areas during the day.

Despite the chance of showers, weather experts warned that the overall conditions will remain hot and humid, keeping the city under persistent discomfort. Citizens have been advised to stay hydrated and avoid unnecessary exposure to the sun during peak hours. The PMD further noted that humidity is expected to keep the "feels-like" temperature higher than the actual reading, leading to ongoing sultry weather across the metropolis.—RT/Agency

Tremors Jolt Karachi as Mild Quake Hits, No Damage Reported

Karachi: Light tremors were felt in the city on Tuesday morning at 9:34 AM, according to the Pakistan Meteorological Department (PMD). The earthquake measured 3.2 on the Richter scale, with a depth of 10 kilometers and its epicenter located 7 kilometers northwest of Malir. The sudden tremors

caused panic among residents, with many rushing out of homes and offices in fear. However, no casualties or reported damage have been reported so far.

Seismologists at PMD described the quake as minor, noting that Karachi lies in a region where low-intensity tremors occasionally occur. Citizens have been advised to remain calm but cautious, as aftershocks cannot be entirely ruled out. Authorities confirmed they are monitoring the situation closely and reiterated that the tremors posed no significant threat to the city's infrastructure or public safety.—RT/Agency

Pakistan Reels From Rs371bn Flood Losses, GDP Target Slashed To 3.9%

ISLAMABAD: Pakistan has appraised the International Monetary Fund (IMF) of economic losses amounting to Rs371 billion in the aftermath of recent floods, which severely damaged infrastructure and agriculture.

The government had set a real GDP growth target of 4.2% for the ongoing fiscal year (FY26), approved by the National Economic Council (NEC) and parliament at the time of the budget. The News reported on Wednesday.

However, in light of the flood-related damages, au-



thorities have projected a downward revision of the target by 0.3 percentage points, bringing it to 3.9%.

ample China's ambassador gave commitment before IMF last time that all rollover and refinancing requirements of Pakistan would be fulfilled within the stipulated time-frame.

The IMF has also been apprised that Islamabad will reappear on the radar screen of the international bond market during the current fiscal year. It may prefer to launch Eurobond in the last quarter (April-June) 2026 with two pre-requisite conditions, including a further reduction in policy rate by Fed

Reserve in US.

Secondly, Pakistan's risk premium recedes with the improvement of one more notch from international rating agencies.

On macroeconomic modelling and flood damages, Pakistani high-ups informed the Fund review mission recent floods caused 1,006 deaths, 1,063 injuries and 12,569 house damages. The floods also caused damage to 2,133 kilometres of roads, 248 bridges and water infrastructure of \$66 in all over the country.—RT/Agency

AJK Protests Turn Deadly With 3 Killed As Govt Seeks Talks With Action Committee

MUZAFFARABAD: The federal government has once again offered negotiations to the Jammu Kashmir Joint Awami Action Committee (JKJAAC) amid ongoing protests, which claimed the lives of three police personnel and injured over 100.

"90% of the committee's demands have already been accepted [...] federal ministers stand as guarantors to ensure implementation of these demands," Federal Minister Tariq Fazal Chaudhry said while addressing a press conference along with AJK Prime Minister Chaudhry Anwar-ul-Haq.

Azad Kashmir witnessed an overwhelming shutdown and wheeljam strike on the



second consecutive day, a day earlier, amid intermittent skirmishes between law enforcers and activists in the state capital, Muzaffarabad. The PAC has issued a 38-point charter of demands, including ending 12 reserved seats for refugees and rolling back "privileges of the elite".—RT/Agency

Over 1,000 Dead In Catastrophic Floods: NDMA

ISLAMABAD: At least 1,006 people, including 275 children, have lost their lives in devastating floods across Pakistan following weeks of relentless torrential rains and flash flooding, the National Disaster Management Authority (NDMA) reported on Wednesday. Rescue and relief operations are ongoing as authorities struggle to reach affected communities and assess the full scale of destruction. Punjab has recorded the highest death toll with 304 fatalities — 110 children, 143 men, and 51 women in Khyber Pakhtunkhwa, 504 people have died, including 90 chil-



dren, while Sindh has reported 80 fatalities. Balochistan confirmed 30 deaths, Gilgit-Baltistan 41, Azad Jammu & Kashmir 38, and Islamabad Capital Territory (ICT) 9. In addition, 1,063 people have been injured na-

Dar, Iranian FM Eye Regional Peace And Stronger Alliance



ISLAMABAD: Deputy Prime Minister and Foreign Minister Ishaq Dar held a telephonic conversation with Iranian Foreign Minister Abbas Araghchi, according to the spokesperson for the Foreign Office.

The two foreign ministers reviewed the state of bilateral relations between Pakistan

and Iran and discussed the overall regional situation.

The spokesperson stated that both sides exchanged views on ongoing diplomatic efforts to promote peace and security in the region. They reaffirmed their commitment to further strengthen bilateral cooperation across multiple sectors.—RT/Agency

Doctors Stunned After Pulling 29 Spoons And 19 Toothbrushes From Man's Stomach

Doctors in Uttar Pradesh's Ghaziabad district successfully removed a staggering 29 steel spoons, 19 toothbrushes and two pans from a man's stomach after a long and complex surgery.

The patient, identified as 35-year-old Sachin from Hapur city, was admitted with intense abdominal pain. Scans revealed dozens of sharp metal and plastic objects lodged inside his stomach.

According to Indian media reports, Sachin had been admitted to a rehabilitation center for drug treatment. He later told doctors that he began swallowing spoons, toothbrushes and pans out of anger and frustration.



He claimed that the center gave him very little food—often just a few vegetables and rotis. Feeling hungry and upset, he would steal spoons, break them in the bathroom, and swallow the pieces with water. How the objects were removed: Doctors initially tried to retrieve the objects using endoscopy, but the

sheer number made it impossible. They then performed surgery to safely remove all items. "Such habits are often linked to patients with mental health issues," the medical team explained, noting that swallowing sharp objects can cause life-threatening injuries if not treated quickly.—RT/Agency

Gaza Flotilla Claims Entry Into Perilous Zone Near Israel

GAZA: The international flotilla trying to deliver aid to Gaza said on Wednesday that it has entered the high-risk zone near the destination, and several of its boats were approached by unidentified vessels, some navigating without lights.

The Global Sumud Flotilla said in a post on Telegram that the vessels have departed, and participants implemented security protocols in anticipation of a possible interception.

"We have now entered the high-risk zone, the area where previous flotillas have been attacked and/or intercepted," the Global Sumud Flotilla wrote on its Telegram channel. "We are on high alert!"

Meanwhile, Italy said it would stop tracking an international flotilla trying to de-



liver aid to Gaza with a military vessel, leaving activists vulnerable to Israeli forces. The Global Sumud Flotilla, consisting of more than 40 civilian boats with over 500 people including parliamentarians, lawyers and Swedish climate campaigner Greta Thunberg, aims to break Israel's

blockade of the Palestinian enclave.

Once the convoy gets within 150 nautical miles (278 km) of Gaza's shoreline, the Italian frigate accompanying it will stop, the Italian defence ministry said in a statement, adding that it expected it to happen at around 0000 GMT.—RT/Agency

Pakistan Clears \$500m Eurobond Payment On Schedule



ISLAMABAD: Pakistan has successfully made the timely repayment of a \$500 million Eurobond, marking a key step in maintaining financial discipline. According to Advisor to Finance Minister Khurram Shehzad, the 10-year Eurobond, issued in 2015, matured on September 30, 2025, and was repaid on schedule.

Shehzad stated that the timely servicing of debt reflects Pakistan's improved liquidity and strong commitment to fiscal responsibility. He added that international institutions have responded

positively, upgrading the country's sovereign ratings, while investor confidence has also strengthened, with Pakistani bonds now trading at a premium.

He further highlighted that Pakistan's debt-to-GDP ratio has declined from 77 percent to 70 percent, while the share of external debt in total public debt has reduced from 38 percent to 32 percent. The advisor said the repayment demonstrates the government's resolve to stabilize the economy and reduce reliance on external borrowings.—RT/Agency

IMF Sets 2031 Deadline To Erase Circular Debt; Govt Moves To Hike Captive Power Levy

ISLAMABAD: The International Monetary Fund (IMF) has set 2031 as the deadline for Pakistan to eliminate the power sector's circular debt, while demanding that the government ensure zero annual inflow of debt each fiscal year, sources said on Wednesday. During the ongoing review talks, officials briefed the IMF delegation that Islamabad has drawn up a 3- to 6-year roadmap to gradually wipe out the power sector's debt. They informed that following a Rs1.2 trillion debt arrangement with banks, the circular debt has been trimmed to around Rs400 billion. As part of reforms, the government has also decided to raise the transition levy on captive power plants.

The levy will first be raised to 10%, and from January 2026 it will be increased further to 15%. According to sources, the government expects to collect Rs105 billion in the current fiscal year from off-grid captive power plants under this levy. In addition, annual tariff rebasing will begin on January 1, 2026.

The IMF delegation was



also briefed on the severe economic toll of last year's devastating floods, which caused an estimated Rs370 billion in damages.

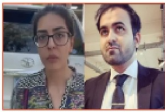
Officials warned that as a result, GDP growth for the current fiscal year could fall to 3.9% against earlier targets.—RT/Agency

Imaan Mazari And Husband Avert Arrest As Islamabad Court Withdraws Warrants

ISLAMABAD: An Islamabad District Sessions Court on Wednesday recalled the non-bailable arrest warrants issued against human rights defenders and lawyers Imaan Zainab Mazari-Hazir and her husband Hadi Ali Chatha after the two appeared in court.

Arrest warrants had been issued for the two lawyers yesterday for failing to appear before the court in a case related to controversial tweets. A junior lawyer informed the court that Mazari and Chatha had left for another appearance in Rawalpindi after marking their attendance earlier in the day.

The case was heard by



Judge Mohammad Afzal Majoka, with police deployed outside the courtroom for tight security.

While the couple appeared in court today, they did not respond with a confirmation or denial when the charge sheet against them was read out.

"We will hire lawyers and can respond to the court regarding this after that," Chatha said. "We have filed a new application regarding our documents ... No indict-

ment can be made until this application is decided."

The accused had earlier applied to obtain their written statements submitted before the Federal Investigation Agency (FIA) under Section 161 (examination of witnesses) of the Code of Criminal Procedure (CrPC) and other documents. Section 161 deals with the power of the police to examine witnesses orally during an investigation and to reduce their statements into writing. Judge Majoka then directed the National Cyber Crime Investigation Agency (NCCIA) to provide the documents to both the lawyers and adjourned the hearing until 11:30am.—RT/Agency

Judicial Storm Brews As High Court Judges Weigh Resignation For Pensions



ISLAMABAD: Some high court judges are reportedly contemplating stepping down from office but not before their service tenure meets the threshold required for a lifelong pension and post-retirement benefits for them and their families, sources told Media. According to insiders, the judges in question are carefully watching the calendar to ensure their resignation comes only after completing the minimum five-year service

period, which, under a recent Supreme Court ruling, is necessary for a high court judge to qualify for pension and other post-retirement privileges. The Supreme Court has previously clarified that a high court judge becomes eligible for pension and related benefits only after serving at least five years on the bench. Without completing this minimum period, a judge's resignation would mean forfeiture of such entitlements.—RT/Agency

Lost US Navy Submarine From WWI Finally Discovered

A United States Navy submarine that disappeared during the First World War has been located in the Pacific Ocean.

According to international media, the vessel lies at a depth of approximately 1,300 feet to the west of San Diego. The submarine, identified as the USS F-1, sank during a wartime exercise. 19 sailors lost their lives in the incident.

Recent exploration of the



site has produced a detailed map of the wreckage using advanced equipment. The operation also served as a training exercise for both pilots and engineers.

The mission was led by

Bruce Strickroft of the Woods Hole Oceanographic Institution. His team, capable of reaching depths of up to four miles, captured images and video from the ocean floor. This capability allowed the team to carry out direct observation of the wreckage.

High-resolution photographs and video footage of the submarine have also been produced by the team.—RT/Agency

PIA Accelerates Push For UK Flight Comeback

ISLAMABAD: The Pakistan International Airlines (PIA) has intensified preparations for the resumption of flight operations to the United Kingdom.

According to details surfaced on Wednesday, applications have been invited for the provision of hotel services for PIA staff in Manchester. The airline is arranging accommodation for



captains, engineers and air hostesses stationed in the city.

Interested parties have been asked to submit applica-

tions by 3 November. Applications will be directed to the General Manager Procurement, the PIA Supply Chain Department.

It is pertinent to note that last week, the PIA has received permission to resume flights to the UK. Following this development, the airline began planning to restart operational activities without delay.—RT/Agency

Family Massacre In Abbottabad As Man Allegedly Guns Down Brother And 3 Relatives

Abbottabad: A man allegedly shot dead his brother, sister-in-law, and their two daughters in Khyber Pakhtunkhwa's Abbottabad district on Wednesday, according to the police.

Abbottabad Police Spokesperson Azam Mir Afzal told Dawn.com that

the incident took place in the Bandi Attai area of Havelian.

"The suspect allegedly killed his brother along with his family members, but the motive behind the murders could not be immediately ascertained."

He said a police team had

been dispatched to the area and a first information report (FIR) was being registered at the Havelian police station. According to the spokesperson, the suspect killed his brother, his sister-in-law, and two nieces before fleeing the scene.—RT/Agency
